Chairman's Report

The main focus of our attention in the coming months is likely to be the impact on traffic and other infrastructure of all the new housing developments emerging and planned within Midlothian. We are endeavouring to find out details of proposals for the Sheriffhall Roundabout, as this is commonly raised with the Committee by members of the Society. This is a Scottish Government matter, rather than a local authority one, but we will continue to impress on our Councillors the huge concerns you have raised with us about increasing traffic pressure.

Over the summer, we had requests from parents in Westmill Road area to see what could be done to facilitate their exit on to the main road when trying to take children to Lasswade High School. The volume of traffic was such that they were having to wait and wait for the chance to turn right to head up the hill to Bonnyrigg. I am delighted to report that, having taken these concerns to the Council, they have now agreed to install a yellow box at the junction and we should see this work done in the next few weeks.

Anti-Litter Initiatives

We have recently formed a LDCS litter sub-group consisting of Rosemary Mackay, Cheryl Ashworth and Lorraine Webster to devise and help implement initiatives to reduce the amount of litter in the Lasswade area. These include:

Lasswade Community Litter-pick

The weekend of June 23rd and 24th 2018 saw an enthusiastic group of local residents collect litter from the roads, lanes, paths, verges and parks of Lasswade. This was organised by the Society on behalf of the 'Keep Scotland Beautiful Campaign' from whom we receive a substantial grant. The Saturday litter collection focussed on the centre of Lasswade village including the community garden, playing field, river-side, graveyards and adjoining paths. On the Sunday, the focus was on Poulton, but also extended to Mavis Bank, Kevock Road and Wadingburn.

We would like to thank Midlothian Council for providing the litter pickers and bags and to Lorraine and Sheena for excellent post-collection refreshments. Thanks are also due to all our 'local litter heroes' who regularly collect litter from the Lasswade area. These include (but are not limited to): Vincent Contini, John Dryden, John Oldham and Ian & Ellen McCallman).

Reducing waste

We have had very encouraging discussions with the manager of McDonalds at Straiton regarding opportunities to reduce the amount of packaging associated with fast food including, for example, by offering re-fillable drinks cups.

Fly-tipping

This remains a major concern in several areas of Lasswade. However, we would like to thank Penicuik Estates for removing over 50 vehicle tyres from Haverall Wood at Wadingburn.

Local History Project

Do you have memories, photographs or other memorabilia from Lasswade in days gone by? If so, the Civic Society would love to hear from you! As a joint project with the Bonnyrigg and Lasswade History Society, we are putting together a Local History page on the new LDCS website which will include scanned photographs and other documents (for example, Lasswade school magazines, publicity from Lasswade businesses, pages from the County of Midlothian Official Handbook etc. etc) together with oral histories from residents and former employees from the Lasswade area.

To start this project off; back in July Rosemary McKay, Wendy Macmillan and Cheryl Ashworth were privileged to meet local residents Betty ? and Margaret ? for an afternoon of tea and reminiscences. Betty lived in Lasswade as a child and attended Lasswade School in the 1940s, while Margaret worked in the cutting room at Todd's Paper Mill (now the Paper Mill restaurant). Both had fascinating stories to tell and between them, painted a vivid picture of life in Lasswade in the 1940s and 1950s. We plan to include their stories on our new web-site, but until then, some of their highlights are worth relating. These include:

- The excitement of catching a train from Lasswade to Portobello
- Memories of the many shops in Lasswade, including Mr Kirk's the butcher and Mrs Kirk's which was one of the 3 sweet shops in Lasswade. There was also a fish shop, chemist, post office, grocers and the bank, among others.
- At New Year there were sing-songs in the pub which is now the Laird and Dog when Betty's father played the piano.
- The Home Guard marching up and down School Green practising with broom handles.
- Todd's Paper Mill was much larger than the current restaurant building and operated round the clock when there were big orders. There was a great camaraderie among the staff.

Hopefully these snippets will give an idea of the sort of reminiscences and information that we are looking for. We are always keen to meet people with first-hand memories of Lasswade and to receive electronic or paper versions of old documents and memorabilia. Paper documents will be scanned and returned if required.

Planning matters

I would like to introduce myself as the new member of the committee with the responsibility of monitoring planning applications relevant to Lasswade. I am Keith Chapman and live in Lasswade itself. I am a retired doctor having spent the majority of my working life as a GP in Dalkeith.

I now spend my time between voluntary work and both old and new hobbies. As a volunteer I am a supporter and trustee of Alzheimer Scotland and the user member of Midlothian Joint integration Board for Health and Social Care.

As for hobbies, my old one is cycling, to try and stave off middle-aged spread, and my new one is learning the piano albeit on background of a long standing love of music. I am about to combine hobbies and volunteering by cycling Pedal for Scotland in support of Alzheimer Scotland.

With reference to planning, I use the Midlothian Council online planning portal to keep up to date with current applications. The committee has commented on a number of applications over the last 6 months during my tenure. Comments have been noted and led to changes in applications, with the current development of the land behind the Laird and Dog perhaps being most notable.

With Midlothian being the fastest growing population in Scotland, there are increasing pressures

to build more housing. Within Lasswade we have seen the granting of planning applications in the Green Belt which defines the settlement. Outwith Lasswade, the continuing expansion housing estates causes ever increasing traffic through the village. Unfortunately we have not seen the promised improvements in Sherriffhall junction that might relieve some of this larger flow of vehicles.

As my experience of planning matters is not enormous, I am grateful of the help I receive from other members of the committee. I am also very happy to be contacted by anyone who wishes to draw the committee's attention to any particular planning issue.




Photographic Competition
